

Entry to Part III Chemistry

The requirements for entry to Part III Chemistry are

1. Submission of a valid set of project choices using the procedures, and by the deadline, described on the teaching website

2. For this year (2020) progression to Part III Chemistry is permitted for anyone satisfying any of the following criteria:

(1) A 2.1 or better in the summer sitting of Part II

(2) A 2.1 overall in Part IB 2018/19

(3) A 2.1 in both Part IB Chemistry A and Chemistry B in 2018/19

(4) An average mark of 60% when Part IB Chemistry A and Chemistry B in 2018/19 are aggregated.

(5) This criterion only applies to students who only took only ONE of Chemistry A and Chemistry B: a 2.1 in either subject.

Note that Colleges may have their own procedures with which students will also need to comply.

Appeals procedure

A student who has submitted project choices according to the above procedures but who has not achieved the required standard in Part II can make an appeal to be allowed to continue to Part III. The procedure is as follows.

1. The appeal should be made **as soon as possible** after the publication of the Part II class list.
2. The appeal should normally be submitted by the student's Director of Studies or Tutor, and should be sent **electronically** to the Secretary of the Faculty Board of Physics and Chemistry, am2730@ast.cam.ac.uk. It will expedite the process if an **electronic copy** is sent to the Director of Teaching (Dr Bill Nolan, wpn1000) at the Department of Chemistry.
3. The appeal must be made using the proforma provided, which must be completed with all the requested information (detailed examination marks, supervision reports).
4. The appeal will be considered by a small Departmental committee, acting on behalf of the Faculty of Chemistry and Physics. The committee expects to act expeditiously.

Please note that the Committee nominated by the Faculty Board to consider special cases is not expected to consider circumstances of a nature on which the Examination Access and Mitigation Committee (EAMC) would normally make a judgement.
